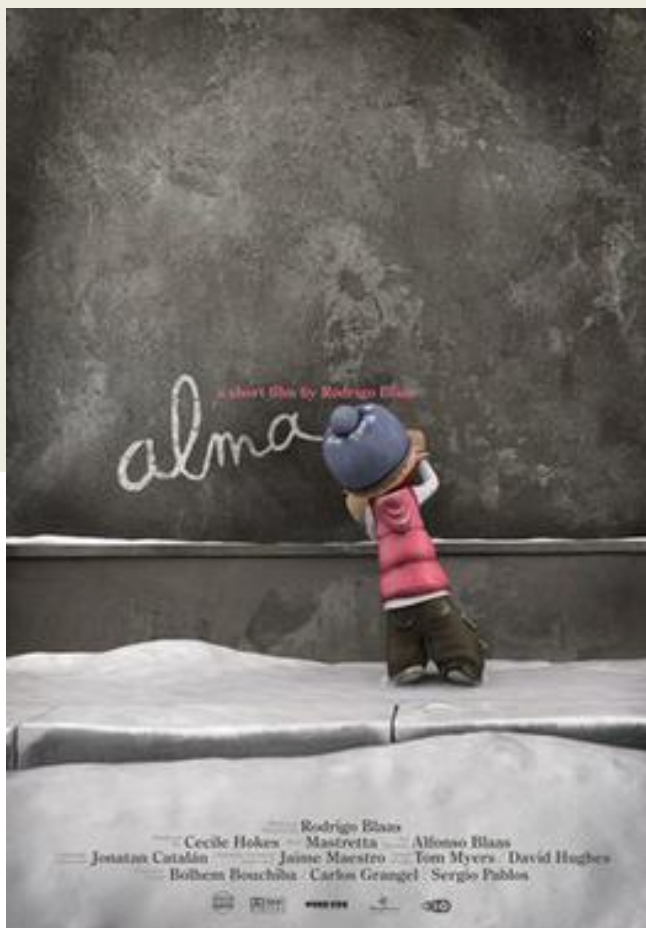
SPOOKY GOINGS ON
