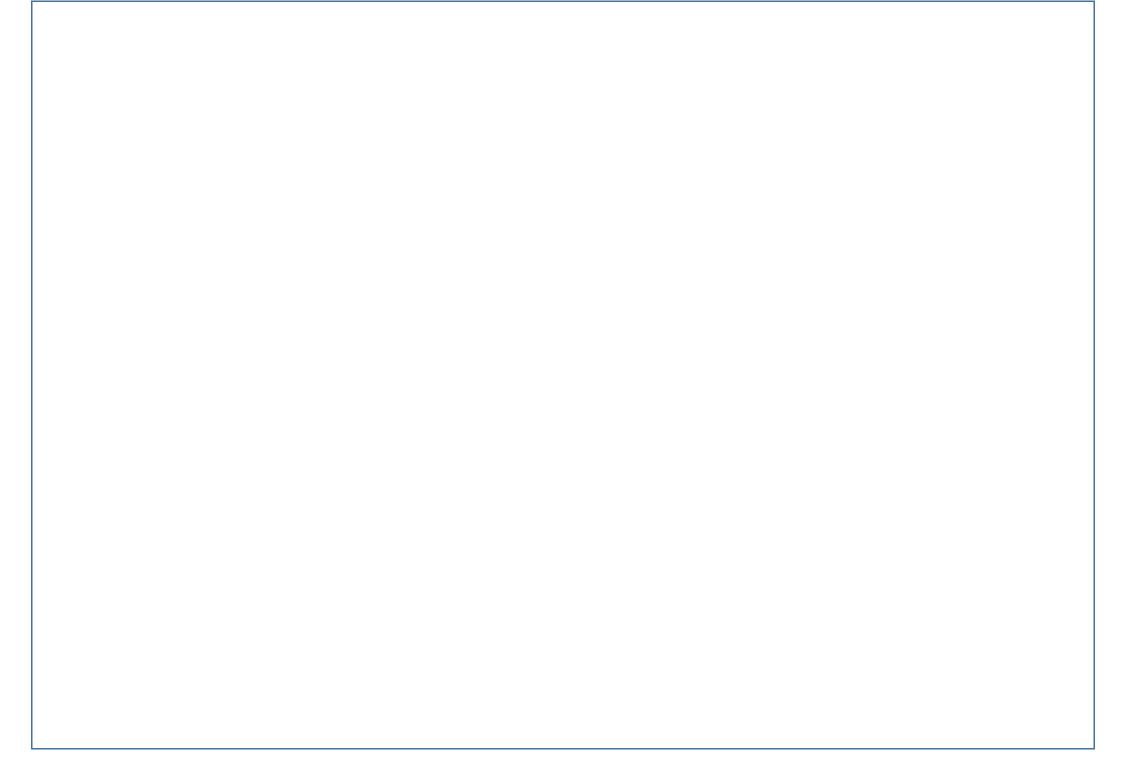


## Sports Premium Strategy 2022 - 2023

Headlines of Impact from Funding Last Year

Sport at Preston Hedges in 2022-23:

- Take up of extra curricular sport in pupils at the school is incredibly high, with 93% of pupils in Y1-6 taking part in sporting clubs at the school or outside of the school.
- Pupils had a wide offer of a range of different ways to be active -including fencing; curling; golf; martial arts.
- All year groups (including Reception) received opportunities to take part in Trust competitions and local athletic competitions

All pupil premium children were offered a club of their choice, as a result, only 2 children chose not to do a club at the school, with 89% of pupil premium taking part in additional extracurricular sport across the year.					We will continue to monitor take up of clubs in the school, and utilise pupil voice to ensure that we have sport in place that is attractive to pupils. This is a role for our PE Lead.  We will also carefully monitor early sporting clubs, to ensure that all possible take up is in place.
